

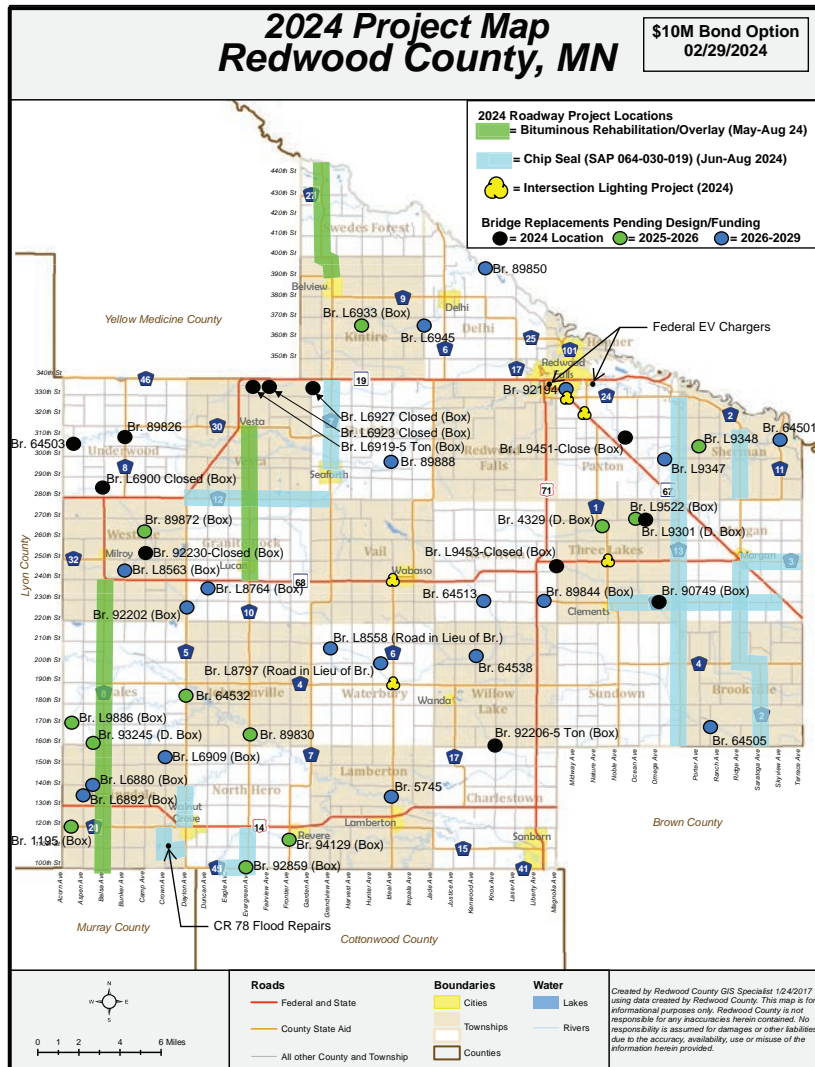


## REDWOOD COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT PUBLISHES INFORMATIONAL VIDEO



February 27, 2024 (Redwood Falls) - Are you looking to better understand how the Redwood County Highway Department works? Are you curious how County Road and Bridge maintenance and construction is funded and what portions

your local property taxes pay for? Anthony Sellner, County Engineer, and Larry Hubert, Maintenance Foreman and Supervisor, walk through these aspects of the Redwood County Highway Department in this intriguing and informative video. By the end of 2024, the Redwood County Hwy Dept will have completed 127 miles of pavement rehabilitation since 2019, accounting for 39% of all paved county roadways. Despite these efforts, there is still much more work to do in the next five years. There is an estimated 115 more miles of pavement rehabilitation or reconstruction needed. Of that 115 miles, 69 miles are still unfunded with an estimated value of \$26M.

There is also substantial bridge reconstruction occurring within Redwood County, funded largely by State and Federal bridge funds. The Highway Department has reconstructed 23 bridge structures between 2021 and 2023, and is looking to reconstruct another 48 structures between 2024 and 2029. These 71 structures represent 24% of all bridge structures in the County. Many of the bridges needing replacement were built around the same time period, and are all coming due to be replaced in a similar time frame. As of today, the Highway Department has secured over \$18M in bridge funding that will be completed over the next two years.

## MNCITLA DAY on the Hill Event, St. Paul

MNCITLA (Minnesota County IT Leadership Association) members traveled to Saint Paul to meet with legislators and advocate for MNCITLA legislative priorities. The group first met with MNIT (Minnesota Information Technology) Commissioner Tarek Tomes, MNIT CISO John Israel, and MNIT Government Relations Director Brandon Hirsch for a roundtable discussion of MNIT and MNCITLA priorities. The group then met with Representative Jim Nash and Representative Kristin Bahner. These were important information sharing discussions and the legislators—both having worked in cybersecurity and software development, respectively—were glad to have fellow technologists visit their offices. Legislators often turn to Representatives Nash and Bahner (and other members with technology experience) to advise them on major decisions about IT-related legislation. So, it was important that they hear from MNCITLA and know that we are paying attention to their work.

## GARDENING SEASON ON ITS WAY!

Rain barrels will be available for \$90 each plus tax, and compost bins will be available for \$76 each at the Environmental Office. Each 45-gallon rain barrel has a spigot, an overflow hose, and a flat-back design for easy placement of a downspout. The 125-gallon compost bins have lockable lids and sliding doors. Both the rain barrels and compost bins are made from 100% recycled plastic materials.

## Spring Marks the Start of Construction Season!

Before construction begins, make sure you contact the Environmental Office to secure the appropriate permits. This includes zoning permits and septic permits. Zoning permits cover buildings and other structures that are constructed or moved onto the property. We have recently updated several of our application forms. The new forms can be found on the website or in person at the Environmental Office counter. For those that qualify, there are septic grants and loans available each year to assist individuals with upgrading noncompliant or failing systems.

Nearly 100 screened volunteers in Redwood County 4-H help maintain our 4-H Safety of Minors goals by completing our screened volunteer program and can wear a variety of hats depending on their interest. In addition to our screened volunteers, we have many more adults who are helping in 4-H programs.

An example, in 2023 we filled 150+ youth and adult volunteer roles just to run the 4-H portion of the Redwood County Fair! We have people who help with





our animal science programs, showcase events, cooking/foods and nutrition programs, education workshops, family fun celebrations, community clubs, SWIM teams, and organizational efforts.
