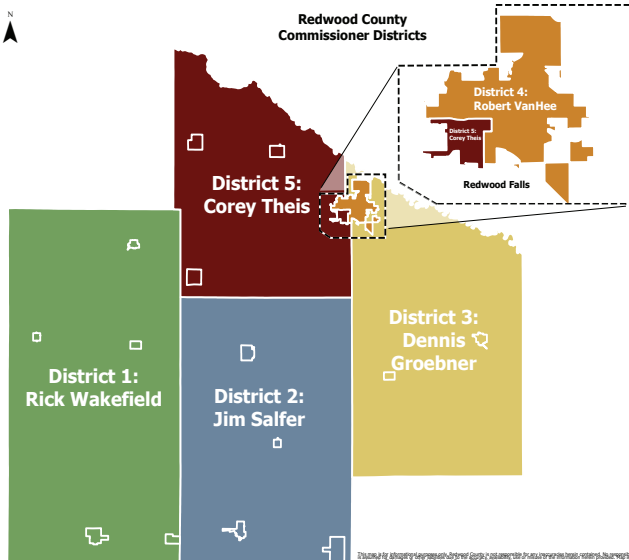

RURAL CHILD CARE INNOVATION PROGRAM NOTIFICATION

Childcare is an economic driver for rural communities across the United States, but many communities are facing shortages of high-quality childcare. Unfortunately, Redwood County is no exception to this detrimental shortage. As of June 2024, Redwood County had an estimated need of over 190 qualified childcare spots, according to the most recent First Children's Finance Childcare Needs Summary. Many new and expecting parents are experiencing the impacts of this shortage firsthand as childcare spots grow increasingly scarce, and costs for providers are at an all-time high. The Redwood County EDA recognizes this critical issue and is taking action to address childcare needs across the County. In October 2024, the Redwood County EDA applied to participate in the First Children's Finance Rural Child Care Innovation **continued on page 2**

Program (RCCIP), and we are excited to announce that Redwood County was selected to participate! The Rural Child Care Innovation Program is a community engagement process designed to address the challenges of childcare in Greater Minnesota. The RCCIP is based on the fundamental idea that rural communities are greater than their size in numbers and greater than their current challenges. By mobilizing and empowering rural communities, the landscape of early care and education in rural America is evolving. The Core Team that will be representing Redwood County in this program is comprised of community members with diverse backgrounds from all areas of the county, to ensure that the needs of all Redwood County constituents are addressed. The Redwood County RCCIP Core Team will participate in the 18-24-month community engagement process to identify the local childcare need and challenges, explore right-sized solutions which address the childcare shortage, and implement goals that are identified throughout this process. The Core Team will be engaging the community in a wide variety of ways during this process, which will include a town hall meeting, childcare provider appreciation event, education opportunities and much more.

Redwood County Administrator Vicki Kletscher Receives 'Joe Ries Award for Excellence in County Management' Award

(St. Paul, MN) – Redwood County Administrator Vicki Kletscher received the 2024 Joe Ries Excellence in County Management Award from the Minnesota Association of County Administrators (MACA).

MACA President and Jackson County Administrator Ryan Krosch selected Kletscher for this honor for exemplifying what it means to be a dedicated county leader who's well respected by both the county board of commissioners and staff alike.

Since 1999, the current president of the Minnesota Association of County Administrators (MACA) selects one MACA member annually to receive the "Joe Ries Excellence in County Management Award" for demonstrating exemplary service and leadership in the field of county management.

This award is named after Joseph F. Ries, who served Scott County with distinction from 1966 to 1992, first as elected County Auditor and then for 21 years as the county's first county Administrator. In 1978, Joe introduced the concept of a professional organization to provide a venue for the sharing of knowledge, information, and experience among the administrative leaders of Minnesota's 87 counties.

HOUSING TRUST FUND ANNOUNCEMENT

You may have seen in our previous newsletters and social media posts that Redwood County recently completed an in-depth County-wide housing study this past October. The results from this study provided the Redwood County Economic Development Authority with an accurate picture of the housing needs in the County and a variety of recommendations to address these needs. While some of these recommendations will take long-term strategic planning to implement, which the EDA continues to develop, we are also taking immediate action to address our housing needs.

At the time this notice was written, documents to establish a Housing Trust Fund for Redwood County have been drafted and a public hearing to approve

the ordinance for this fund was set for Tuesday, March 18th, 2025, at 9:00am. The purpose of this fund will be to support the development of new housing units and refurbishment of current housing units across Redwood County. It is the goal of the EDA to have this ordinance, its guiding policy and application form fully approved and available to the public in the spring of 2025, so construction on projects can begin this coming summer.

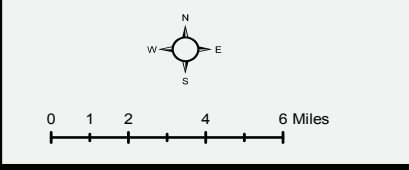
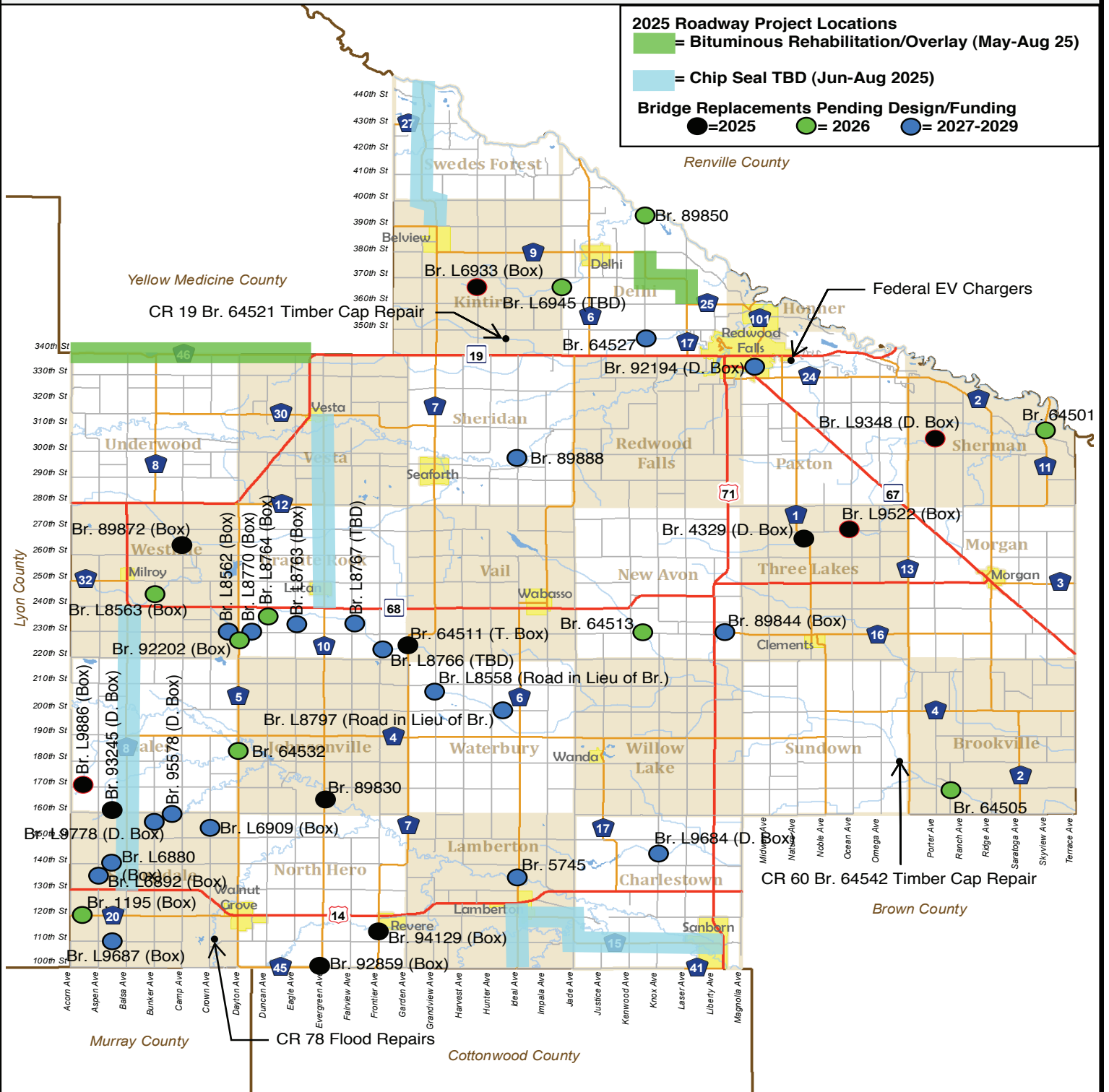

CHILD'S PLACE NARRATIVE

What is Child's Place?

Child's Place is a children's advocacy center (CAC) that provides services to children to have experienced sexual assault, physical abuse, severe neglect, drug endangerment or witness significant violence. Child's Place is located in Redwood County and is one of 11 CACs in Minnesota.

The CAC originated as the Redwood County Children's Advocacy Center in 2015. In 2020 the department transitioned to a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, Child's Place. The transition to a standalone nonprofit opened the doors for other grants and funding opportunities and allowed for the expansion of services in our area.

What do you see "out here"?

We often are asked "do you really see that kind of stuff out here?" or hear statements such as "well, that doesn't happen out here."

Abuse does occur "out here", in our rural communities. Child's Place served 109 children in 2024. Almost half of the cases involved sexual assault.

In addition to local cases, Child's Place also partners with Homeland Security and the FBI in situations where the victims reside in our area. These cases are typically online sextortion cases or situations where the abuser crossed state lines to get to the child.

Why use the CAC model?

Without a CAC, a child may end up having to tell the worst story of his or her life over and over again, to doctors, police, lawyers, therapists, investigators, judges, and others. They may not get the help they need to heal once the investigation is over, either. Having to share the story with this many people only traumatizes the child more due to continually having to relive the abuse. When children tell their history of abuse multiple times, they can become weary of retelling all the details and sometimes even take back the whole thing because they don't want to talk about it anymore or feel as if no one believes them.

With a CAC, like Child's Place, when law enforcement or child protective services believe a child is being abused, the child is brought to the CAC by a caregiver or other safe adult. At the CAC, the child tells their story once to a trained interviewer who will listen to all the details

of the abuse. The interview is recorded and observed by a multidisciplinary team (MDT) which includes law enforcement, child protective services, prosecution, mental health providers and other professionals involved with the case. This way everyone who needs to hear the child's story is able to without having the child tell it over and over again. The MDT will then make decisions together on how to help the child. Finally, the advocate will coordinate resources such as therapy, safety needs (security cameras, orders for protection), basic needs (food, clothes, bedding) assist with courtroom preparation, victim impact statements and be a voice for the child during the court process.

The Redwood County multi-disciplinary team (MDT) includes members from the Redwood County Sheriff's Office, Redwood Falls Police Department, Redwood County Attorney's Office, Southwest Health and Human Services (child protection) and Child's Place staff.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT

After many years of no changes to the Environmental Assessments (RRRSWA) that fund programs and facilities that manage waste, promote recycling, and support sustainable waste practices in Redwood and Renville Counties, the County Boards of both counties have authorized a new fee schedule that will be implemented with 2025 property taxes. As was noted in the Winter 2024 edition of *The County Messenger*, here's a summary of the key uses of these funds:

Recycling and Waste Collection

- **Recycling Program:** Employs workers to collect, transport, and recycle over 5,200 tons of materials annually, achieving over 50% curbside recycling collection in the two counties.
- **Transfer Facilities:** Manages municipal solid waste, demolition debris, and recycling materials, handling nearly 16,000 tons of garbage and demolition waste annually.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Facilities

- Safely dispose of hazardous materials like used oil, paints, chemicals, and batteries.
- Operates a product exchange room where residents can take reusable household items for free.

Special Programs and Services

- Provides free & safe license plate disposal collection bins locations at RRRSWA, landfill & The Redwood County Government Center.
- Provides facilities for recycling, demolition debris, and garbage disposal.
- Offers free document destruction (shredding) for residents, free scrap metal disposal, and mattress recycling (for a minimal fee).
- Hosts tire recycling events, seasonal recycling for holiday lights, and sells backyard compost bins.
- Places recycling trailers/bins at events, gas stations, and parks.
- Provides convenient locations and containers to respectfully dispose of tattered military flags.

Community and Educational Support

- Organizes electronic waste and appliance collection events (April-October).
- Offers educational programs about waste reduction, composting, demolition disposal, recycling and waste management for residents, haulers, and contractors.
- Assists with pesticide container disposal and provides demolition disposal inspections and guidance for MPCA Permit by Rule Applications.

Resident and Business Assistance

- Maintains 26 recycling sites across the counties.
- Provides centralized support for waste-related inquiries and hauler information.

These efforts aim to improve sustainability and reduce the environmental impact of waste in the region. For more information or questions, residents can contact the Redwood/Renville Solid Waste Authority directly.

New Fee Schedule

Here are the key points of the resolution adopted by both County Boards and the new fee schedule:

The assessment charged shall be titled “Env Assessment (RRRSWA)” and shall not be tied to a property’s perceived ability to produce waste.

The annual assessment effective Jan. 1, 2025 shall be as follows and shall continue to be assessed annually until formally changed by resolution:

- Agricultural/Residential properties (which may be comprised of multiple contiguous parcels that make up a single residence) shall be assessed a single \$68 fee.
- City, County, State and Federal properties with a structure shall each be assessed a \$45 fee.
- Cemeteries with a structure shall be assessed a \$31 fee.
- Manufactured home parks shall be assessed a \$86 fee.
- Individual manufactured and modular homes shall be assessed a \$68 fee.
- Individual church properties with a structure shall each be assessed a \$68 fee.
- Charitable Institutions (code 931) shall each be assessed a \$45 fee.
- All other properties with a structure (including schools, apartments, nursing homes, HRA-owned properties, & hospitals) shall be assessed based on the market value of the property:

These fees shall be administered by the County Assessor based on the classification and value of the property. Appeals of this assessment shall be made on a form provided by RRRSWA and reviewed by the RRRSWA Executive Board for evaluation and consideration, based on the criteria stated above.

Plastic containers - #s 1, 2 & 5. Must be removed from bags - No Styrofoam, No bags, No toys, No pools, No siding, No PVC pipe, No pesticide containers, No herbicide containers



Steel and Aluminum - Food and beverage cans aluminum foil, pie pans and aerosol cans (must be empty). No food remaining - empty and clean. No need to remove labels on food cans.



Glass - *Single Use, clear, green and brown bottles and jars (food and beverage containers only.) No need to remove labels. No light bulbs, mirrors, ceramics or dishes. Must be empty and clean. * Canning jars are not acceptable.



Paper - Newspaper, junk mail, paperbacks, catalogs, phone books, envelopes (including windowed) and office paper. Do Not bundle or tie - place in cart loosely



Cardboard - (folded flat) Brown paper grocery bags, boxboard (cereal, cracker, pasta and shoe boxes). No frozen food or refrigerated food boxes. No beer or pop boxes (6 packs, 12 packs or cases) No packing foam. No waxed cardboard. No furnace filters. No egg cartons of any kind.

Plastic Bags/Film Plastic: Please purchase and utilize reusable grocery bags, ask for paper or have your groceries loaded loosely into your cart. **Do NOT place bags or other film plastic into your recycling container.**

Shredded Paper: Please utilize our shredding service, which is FREE for personal papers, nominal fee for businesses. IF you shred your own paper, please bag it and bring it to the office located at the RRRMRF in Redwood Falls.
